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PROFESSOR RANDA BALIGH

(A NEVER-ENDING JOURNEY OF PASSION)

Professor Dr. Randa Baligh was born in Alexandria, Egypt, on July 1964, 18. She grew up in Cairo and resided abroad for a period while her parents studied medicine in England, and again during her studies in the United States in the 1990s. She was fascinated by Egyptian antiquities from a young age, visiting Egyptian archaeological sites and museums or watching historical films. She studied at Port Said Language



School in Zamalek (Manner House) and then obtained the GCE certificate, which is equivalent to the British General Secondary Education Certificate (1980). She studied at the American University in Cairo (Bachelor of Arts on January 1985,21). While studying at the American University in Cairo, the specialization of Egyptian archeology as a first degree was not yet available, but she chose to study materials from archeology and the ancient Egyptian language with Professor Dr. Fayza Heikal and Professor Dr. Kent Weeks. She then obtained a Diploma in Egyptian Archeology from the Faculty of Archeology, Cairo University (1987), where she was taught by great professors such as Professor Dr. Abdul Aziz Saleh, Professor Dr. Ali Radwan, Professor Dr. Jaballah Ali Jaballah, Professor Dr. Sayed Tawfik, and Professor Dr. Abdul Halim Nour El-Din, who was a spiritual father to her and all archaeologists and graduates of tourism and hotels. She then traveled to the United States, where she studied in the Master of Egyptian





Archeology program for a year at Brown University in Rhode Island and assisted in the Dictionary of Late Egyptian project with her late professor, Leonard Lesko. After this, she transferred to Yale University in Connecticut, where she obtained a Master of Philosophy in Egyptian Archeology (1994), which is higher than a Master of Arts but was equated with a Master of Egyptian Archeology, and then a Ph.D. with Highest Honors (1998), which is equivalent to honors with high distinction in Egyptian universities, for a thesis in English titled: Tuthmosis I. Her doctoral supervisor was Professor of Egyptian Archeology and scholar William Kelly Simpson, who was the president of the International Association of Egyptologists (IAE) at the time, and he and his wife established the library of the American Research Center in Cairo, and he also established a visiting professor degree in Egyptian Archeology at the American University in Cairo. She obtained a diploma in tourist guidance from the Faculty of Tourism and Hotels, Helwan University (1991), a diploma in environmental management from the Faculty of Political Science and Economics, Cairo University (2000), a diploma in museum studies from the Faculty of Archeology, Cairo University (2003), and a diploma in Coptic studies in a joint program between the Faculty of Archeology, Fayoum University, the Library of Alexandria, and the Franciscan Order in Egypt (2015). She obtained a Kami certificate in the Coptic language with the ancient pronunciation from the Institute of the Coptic Language with the ancient pronunciation in Abbassia from teachers who grew up in families who still speak Coptic at home today. She also began studying for a Saji certificate in the Coptic language in the same place.



Professor Dr. Randa worked in several American educational institutions after graduating from the American University in Cairo, the Fulbright Commission, and Amideast, and she also worked in foreign journalism for a period, working in the Cairo office of the Los Angeles Times newspaper and ABC American television in Maspero. She worked in university teaching at Yale University before returning from the United States, then at the American University in Cairo after her return, and she also worked as a principal researcher in the Theban Mapping Project at the American University in Cairo (TMP), where she was responsible for collecting data and measuring the sites of royal million-year temples in the western mainland of Luxor.

She was appointed as a lecturer in Egyptian archeology at the Faculty of Arts, Mansoura University, on July 2000 ,31, and she progressed in positions until she became the acting head of the department with the degree of assistant professor from 2009, then the head of the Department of Ancient Egyptian Archeology with the degree of professor at the Faculty of Arts, Mansoura University, in 2015 until the end of October 2021, except for periods when she apologized for the presidency of the department to take care of her parents. She became a professor emeritus from July 2024 ,18. During her presidency of the department, she established a museum of archaeological replicas in the college (established with the encouragement of Professor Dr. Mohamed Ahmed Ghoneim, Professor of Anthropology in the Department of Sociology in the college and dean of the







college at the time, and with a large discount on archaeological replicas from Dr. Zahi Hawass, who was the Secretary-General of the Supreme Council of Antiquities at the Ministry of Culture at the time, and colleague Professor Dr. Ayman Wahbi played a major role in transporting and placing the pieces in the museum, and he also donated a replica of the mask of Tutankhamun, which is considered the jewel of the museum). She made several study regulations for the department for the first university degree in the old system, in the credit hour system, and also regulations for graduate studies. Graduate studies began in the department



from the year she took over the responsibility of the department, i.e., from 2009, and she established a scientific library for the department, and she also submitted a file to establish a college of archeology that the university may establish in the future.

She published a number of scientific papers in English and Arabic, and textbooks, and she supervised a number of scientific theses and discussed a number of theses. She was honored by the Ministry of Antiquities for her role in protecting heritage in the Egyptian Museum in Tahrir during the January 2011 revolution, and she won the award for the best research for specialized professors from the Association of Egyptian Archaeologists in 2022 for research on epidemics in ancient Egypt, in addition to scholarships at home and abroad during her studies from Brown, Yale, and Oxford universities, and she was on the Dean's Honor Roll at the American University in Cairo for two consecutive years. She participated in the department's excavations at Tell Tebella in Mansoura for several years (2021-2018). Professor Dr. Randa Baligh is a member of the International Association of Egyptologists (IAE), the International Association for Coptic Studies (IACS), a member of the Board of Directors of the Arab Council of the General Union of Arab Archaeologists, and Vice President of the Society of Lovers of Coptic Heritage.

In addition to her membership in several heritage preservation societies, including the Egyptian Heritage Revival Society, the Society for the Preservation of Egyptian Heritage, and her support for the Egypt Heritage Society, Dr. Randa Baligh is also known for her interest in energy studies and various forms of alternative or complementary medicine. She has obtained numerous international certifications in homeopathy, pranic healing, Reiki, bio-geometry, Feng Shui, Bach and Bush flower remedies, and dowsing.


